Welcome To The FaithWorks Family

Tab Miller Joins FaithWorks as Director of Volunteer Ministries/Operations



Tab Miller recently joined FaithWorks as the new Director of Volunteer Ministries/ Operations.

Tab has served locally in many capacities, most recently as an Associate Pastor for College Place UMC for three and a half years. Tab and his spouse, Natalie, moved to Glynn County in 2011 after Tab graduated from Asbury Theological Seminary, days after the birth of their first daughter, Audrey (11). They have two more daughters, Tabitha (6) and Lia (3).

Since 2008, Tab has served as Director of Ministries and Missions for Tab Smith Ministries, which works with a network of nonprofits that serve the Navajo people

of the desert Southwest. Tab usually travels three to six times per year to train indigenous pastors from fourteen Navajo churches across the Navajo Reservation, an area about the size of West Virginia, covering parts of New Mexico, Arizona, and Utah. He and his family are very excited about starting a new chapter of ministry with Faithworks as we strengthen our volunteer ministries.

Changes At The Well - FaithWorks Welcomes Nancy Heiden Peed

Beginning September 1, FaithWorks welcomes Nancy Heiden Peed as the new Manager at The Well, FaithWorks' hospitality center for people who are homeless.

Born in Brunswick, Nancy has devoted much of her professional career in the hospital arena, where she practiced as a Registered Respiratory Therapist for 13 years. She also served for 19 years as the President/CEO of Peach County Hospital.

Peed most recently completed a four-year term where she served as a CCW (cross cultural worker) in Uganda. While there, she fell in love with the people who were homeless and from those relationships founded the first homeless ministry in that area. She was also active in founding a revolving loan program for vulnerable women. She has one daughter and is again a resident of Glynn County.

Your Support Lifts 300 Families Each Month Through Sparrow's Nest

Our incredible volunteers, new or veteran, have been the backbone that has allowed us to provide food assistance throughout the pandemic without interruption.

We have been fortunate to have the continued support of volunteers, donors, churches and civic groups hosting food drives and providing monetary help to allow us to continue to serve those in need.

Sparrow's Nest Highlights:

• United Way and Coastal Georgia Foundation granted Covid-19 Emergency Relief funds totaling \$50,000 for those directly impacted by Covid-19 needing utility assistance.

- Rich's Products and the Davis Love Foundation awarded a \$10,000 grant to provide fresh meat to guests, a new freezer, and other needs.
- Partnered with Second Harvest and Sparrow's Nest volunteers to provide food deliveries every few months to almost 200 seniors and other homebound individuals without transportation.
- Continued support from the SSI Community Garden, Adam Wainwright and 5 Oaks Farm providing fresh vegetables and much more each week.

Giving Hope For Families

Mary's Story

Mary has worked for the hospital for 16 years. Due to Covid-19 and precautions taking place at the hospital, her hours were reduced from 40 hours per week to 30 hours.

She has three children to care for and was already living paycheck-to-paycheck. During this time period, she also had a plumbing leak at her house but was unaware of it until her bill came. It was triple the amount from the previous month.

Her landlord repaired the leak but the bill was still very high even after the water department completed a leak adjustment. We were able to get her bill current so she did not lose service.

FaithWorks Profile - Rev. Jenna Kennedy

My journey to FaithWorks began when I first accepted a call to ministry. I felt a calling to work with those experiencing homelessness in Atlanta.

I knew I wanted to work with compassion and justice issues that would connect the local church to the world outside the doors, so I attended Candler School of Theology, earned my Masters of Divinity and became ordained as a Deacon in the United Methodist Church.

After 17 years of ministry work as an Associate Pastor in neighborhoods outside of Atlanta, I decided in 2019 to get back to my original calling of working with the homeless and I began a job at Action Ministries in North Georgia, now known as HOPE Atlanta.

My role there was to connect local faith communities to our ministries and educate others about the services Action Ministries offered and how they could help. It was wonderful work, but I was still missed not being able to interact with people and hear their stories and form relationships.

In February, a friend connected me to Wright Culpepper. I visited Brunswick where I saw FaithWorks programs in action. I was blown away not only by the programs that were offered, but most of all by the importance of forming relationships with every person that came to FaithWorks for assistance.

The importance was not on simply getting that individual what they needed, but also on making sure they knew they were cared for by at least one person in this world and by God. In a world that judges success by volume, it was so refreshing to be in a place that took the time to care for the individual and to carve out space for relationships to happen, and not just by those that work for FaithWorks.
